# Enjoy Our New Seats!!!

With a generous donation from Phyllis and Bob Henigson along with donations of time and money from several dozen of our supporters, our new seats are here and mostly installed. The seats arrived from the manufacturer in Rapid City, Michigan just one week behind the original schedule. Several people jumped in to help and we got most of them installed in time for this show. As of this writing, we are awaiting some small parts from the manufacturer to install the final six seats.

We will soon install a plaque on the wall listing everyone who donated time or money to this project regardless of the amount. It's not too late to donate and have your name listed on our wall plaque.

If you look around, there are still about a dozen armrests without a donor's name on them. For a donation of \$150, you can have your name on one of these poor, naked armrests. Just a suggestion...

### Directors Notes:

Directing a farce is always a challenge. "Hotbed Hotel" ties the record for the most entrances with "Noises Off." Besides the four doors on the stage, there is an entrance from stage left (where the unseen rooms are located), an entrance down the stairs (from the staff quarters), an entrance through the audience to the front door of the hotel and another entrance through the audience from the patio of Room 7 - a total of eight.

Farces require split-second timing with actors entering and exiting from each exit. One special challenge for this play is to get actors from back stage to entering through the audience with just a few seconds to spare.

Farces also have lots of actors on stage at one time—an even bigger challenge with our small stage and then splitting it in half with the hotel lobby and Room 7. It makes it difficult to get everyone where they can be seen without looking like stacked logs.

I need to thank all the actors for all their hard work, particularly Suzanne Gropper who spent countless hours working with the actors to help them get their lines down pat.

I really enjoyed working with this extraordinary group of actors who have had such vastly different amounts of experience. They have melded into a cohesive troupe.
