What's Next for Actors Theater?

I don't know. Attendance at the last two plays I've directed has been disappointing. I've talked to dozens of people. I came away from these discussions wondering if we are doing too much theater. Are we wearing out our audiences?

The actors still look forward to acting, the production crews still look forward to building sets and sewing costumes and I am still excited about producing and directing plays. But, to spend five months on a play (from starting hard work on the script to closing night) and end up making a few hundred dollars is disappointing. The good news is that we continue to make money: None of our local productions has EVER lost money although some have come very close. We have raised ticket prices from \$5 to \$10 for this year's PlayFest because audiences have dropped off to the point where we can't make ends meet at \$5.

So, what's next? The truth is that I don't know. Maybe we'll do some readers theater, maybe a small play in the fall, maybe some training programs. If you have any ideas or suggestions, I'd like to hear them.
