We expect the new seats to be delivered by the end of the year so you will be able to enjoy them for our next production which will run the last two weekends in February and the first weekend in March.

Our upcoming season:

While we are not sure what play we will present in February, we do know that auditions will be held late this month!!!

After that, we will have our Playfest in April and May.

The last three weekends in July we will present "Love, Loss and What I Wore" by Nora Ephron and Delia Ephron. Nora Ephron is best known for her screenplays including: When Harry Met Sally", "Sleepless In Seattle", "You've Got Mail" and most recently "Julie and Julia". "Love, Loss and What I Wore" ran for over 1,000 performances off-Broadway before closing a few months ago. "Love, Loss and What I Wore" uses clothing and accessories and the memories they trigger to tell funny and often poignant stories.


We haven't finalized the play we will present the first three weekends in September but it will be something offbeat and unusual.

The PlayFest highlights the talents of local writers, actors, directors and stage crews. We encourage anyone to give it a go. We have a supportive group of experienced playwrights who will step forward to assist the first-time writer. Also, guidelines and samples will be sent to each participant to ensure each has the appropriate information for submission.

Each play will be reviewed by experienced local theater people before selection of the seven plays to be produced. Early submission is desirable so writers can receive feedback and make revisions if desired. Submission deadline is February 15. Rehearsals typically begin in early April. FROM THE DIRECTOR

Veterans' issues are an important part of my life, having been married to two Vietnam veterans. When Doug Bechtel asked me to read "Tracers" more than three years ago, I was moved by the play and convinced we needed to make it happen.

First, I needed to learn how to direct; Doug generously offered and shared his time and experience as I interned with him last year for several productions.

Second, I was told by many that we would never find eight young men on Orcas who could give of their time to work on a play. To recruit that elusive cast, I posted an audition notice in the men's room at The Lower Tavern and talked to perhaps every male on the island under 40. After many long months, our stellar cast finally came together!

A director could not ask for a more enthusiastic or devoted group. This cast, although with limited stage experience, independently researched ways to bring authenticity to their roles, and went above and beyond with their level of hard work and blossoming talent. They held weekly independent, off-site rehearsals.

This production is nothing if not a team effort. Stage Manager Cara Russell became an invaluable sounding board, both for creative brainstorming and as a grounding influence. With the monumental assistance of Gillian Smith, bits of uniforms and military memorabilia came from all over the island—including a boonie cap I commandeered off someone's head at Island Market.
